The Fremont County Board of Supervisors met in regular session on Wednesday, July 6, 2022, in the Fremont County Courthouse Boardroom, with Hickey, Clark and Sheldon present. A quorum was declared, and the meeting officially called to order at 9:00 a.m. Minutes of the previous board session were read and approved. The agenda was approved as posted.

Let the records show that Engineer Dan Davis, Treasurer Alise Snyder, Roger Brink, Sherrie Brink, Dean Weiss, Joan Kirk, Melody Van Scyoc, Clint Wooten, Stephen Thatcher, Kristen Thatcher, Steve Perdue, Donna Perdue, Ida Van Scyoc, Tandon Van Scyoc, Gregory Christensen, Kathy Beam, Nancy Weiland, Heather Coulter, and Liz Skillern with Valley News Today were present for this meeting. Kim Tudor and Ryan Urkoski joined by telephone.

The board advised the group of the 5-minute time limit per speaker for the public comment portion of the meeting. Ida Van Scyoc spoke regarding the wind turbines. She spoke about a prior meeting when Sheldon questioned why there was only 2 people that had public comment in 2019. Sheldon inadvertently stated in the 6/14/22 meeting that the hearings were held and the ordinance was passed in 2019. It was in 2020, but he was correct about only two people with public comment. Van Scyoc pointed out the maps that were provided by Invenergy were missing many houses in that area and she didn't believe the setbacks were correct. Van Scyoc stated that if the board had done their due diligence they would have noticed that. The board stated that it was their understanding that the houses shown on the map were the participating landowners but would ask Invenergy for clarification. Clint Wooten said that he felt that Locust Grove was taking the bullet for Fremont County. He spoke about the condition of gravel roads depending on what route they use to bring turbines in and questioned if they would cut into other property owner's corners. He talked about the company not stopping if it was raining and that tearing up the roads even more. The board stated again that they are to put the roads in the original condition or better. There were multiple comments and conversations happening at once during the meeting. There were public comments from visitors including Tandon Van Scyoc, Steve and Donna Perdue, Roger and Sherrie Brink, Dean Weiss, Joan Kirk, Kristen Thatcher, Nancy Weiland, Heather Coulter, Treasurer Alise Snyder, Engineer Dan Davis, and the members of the board of supervisors. Tandon Van Scyoc asked about the definition of conservation. He questioned how wind turbines affected any conservation areas close by such as CRP ground and watersheds. The topic of public hearing and publications of those hearings was brought up again. The board published according to the Iowa Code before each hearing was held. Ida Van Scyoc voiced that she didn't think the hearings should have been held during the pandemic with the courthouse closed. The board and auditor assured her that the courthouse was not closed during these hearings. Treasurer Snyder spoke about the lack of industry in Fremont County. She pointed out that the loss of Eaton Corporation was significant. Weiland asked the board to consider moving the public hearing to a night meeting. The board pointed out that it has already been published and Invenergy sent notices to residents. Weiland asked that the boards table the decision and hold a night meeting. Supervisor Sheldon discussed that the county would open themselves up to litigation if Invenergy adheres to the ordinance with their application and the board denies it. After much discussion, Roger Brink, Sherrie Brink, Dean Weiss, Joan Kirk, Melody Van Scyoc, Clint Wooten, Stephen Thatcher, Kristen Thatcher, Steve Perdue, Donna Perdue, Ida Van Scyoc, Tandon Van Scyoc, Gregory Christensen, Kathy Beam, Nancy Weiland, and Shelley Jennings left the meeting at 10:12 a.m.

The board considered the resolution approving the engineer's plan and report for the proposed drainage district at HWY 2/I29. Motion by Sheldon to approve Resolution No. 2022-41. Motion carried unanimously.

RESOLUTION NO. 2022-41

RESOLUTION APPROVING PLAN AND REPORT OF ENGINEER

FOR PROPOSED HIGHWAY 2/I-29 CROSSROADS LEVEE DISTRICT,

AND ESTABLISHING PUBLIC HEARING DATE AND TIME

WHEREAS, affected landowners previously filed a Drainage/Levee Petition ("Petition") with the Fremont County Auditor in or around October 22, 2020, for the establishment of a levee system to be located at the Highway 2 and I-29 interchange located in Fremont County, Iowa; and

WHEREAS, in accord with Chapter 468 of the Iowa Code, Olmsted & Perry Consulting Engineers, Inc. ("Olmsted") was duly appointed to provide a plan and report for the establishment of such a levee district to protect property owners generally located at the intersection of Highway 2 and Interstate 29 in Fremont County, Iowa; and

WHEREAS, Olmsted has prepared and presented to the Fremont County Board of Supervisors an Engineering Report in accord with §468.14 of the Iowa Code dated August 31, 2021, and as revised February 21, 2022, for consideration by the Fremont County Board of Supervisors; and

WHEREAS, Olmsted presented the Engineering Plan to the Fremont County Board of Supervisors on March 23, 2022, and the Fremont County Board of Supervisors desires to tentatively approve said Engineering Report dated August 31, 2021, and as revised on February 21, 2022.

IT IS THEREFORE RESOLVED BY THE FREMONT COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. In accord with §468.14 of the Iowa Code, the Fremont County Board of Supervisors hereby provides its approval to the Olmsted Engineering Report dated August 31, 2021, and as revised February 21, 2022.
- 2. It is ordered that a public hearing on the pending Petition for Establishment of Levee District is set for the 17th day of August, 2022, at 9:30 a.m. at the Fremont County Courthouse located at 506 Filmore Street, Sidney, Iowa. In accord with §468.14, the Fremont County Auditor shall cause notice to be given to the owner of each tract of land or lot within the proposed levee district and as shown by the transfer books of the Auditor's Office, including railway companies having right-of-way in the proposed district into all the lienholders and encumbrancers of any land within the proposed district without naming them,

lienholders and encumbrancers of any land within the proposed district without naming them, and also to all persons whom it may concern, without naming individuals all actual occupants of the land in the proposed district, the pendency relief requested in the Petition filed on or around October 22, 2020, with the Fremont County Auditor. All claims for damages, except claims for land required for right-of-way, and all objections to the establishment of the district shall be made in writing and filed with the Fremont County Auditor at or before the time set for hearing.

- 3. The aforesaid notice shall be served by publication at least twenty (20) days before the hearing date, and copies of said notice shall be sent by ordinary mail to each person named in the notice at that person's last known mailing address, with said notice to be mailed not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set for hearing. The Fremont County Auditor shall file Proofs of Publication and Proofs of Service by Affidavit prior to the scheduled hearing date and time.
- 4. At the time set for public hearing on the Petition, the Fremont County Board of Supervisors shall hear and determine the sufficiency of the Petition in form and substance and all objections filed against the establishment of such district. After said public hearing, the Board may (1) order further investigation and examination and continue the hearing to a fixed date; (2) dismiss the Petition; or (3) approve and establish the proposed district in accordance with the recommendation of the Engineering Report on file with the Fremont County Auditor.

The Fremont County Board of Supervisors met in regular session on Wednesday, July 13, 2022, in the Fremont County Courthouse Boardroom, with Hickey, Clark and Sheldon present. A quorum was declared, and the meeting officially called to order at 9:00 a.m. Minutes of the previous board session were read and approved. The agenda was approved as posted.

Chairman Hickey addressed the audience advising of their 5-minute time limit & asked that they be respectful of eachother.

Let the records show that Treasurer Alise Snyder, Deputy Mike Wake, Assistant County Attorney Ryan Dale, Marjorie L. McQueen, Shirley L. Thrasher, David Glenn, Mark Crowl, Bret Dublinske, Shawn Haynie, Sandra (Ohrt) Jensen, Tandon Van Scyoc, Brett Craven, Noel Gandy, Jill Gandy, Penny Bredensteiner, Kim Tudu, Erman Mullins, Gary Moody, Gayle Moody, Mike Peterson with KMA, Lewis Martin, Isaac Lampe, Andrew Lacina, Ginger Gruber, Mandy Whipple, John Whipple, Donald Laumann, Nancy Ohrt, Charles Dovel, Mike Dovel, Ryan Urksoki, Kalen Fulk, Dennis Almquist, Sherrie Brink, Dean Weiss, Joan Kirk, Mike Whisler, Melinda Whisler, Jeff Shearer, Ben Roberts, Steve Perdue, Donna Perdue, Ida Van Scyoc, Brian Langner, Gregory Christensen, Rebecca Dublinske, Gary Peregrine, Ryan Slater, Christi Slater, Diane Marshall, Norma Troxel, Steve Stenzel, Heather Coulter, Jacob Holmes, and Liz Skillern with Valley News Today were present for this meeting. Present by teleconference were IT Arnold Emberton, Dan Litchfield, Jeff Ellenbogen, M.D., Ethan Hewitt, Ryan Matheny, Michael Hankard, Dylan L., M. Fulk, Mike MaRous, David Loomis, and several callers that didn't identify themselves.

At 9:10 a.m., Sheriff Kevin Aistrope joined the meeting.

Sherrie Brink addressed the board showing them a photo of a wind tower made to scale. She said she would donate her time to another person present at the meeting. The board stated that she could use her five minutes, but it could not be "donated".

Brian Langner, Fisher Township, read what the scope of authority of Iowa Supervisors which included in part "to perform any function to protect and preserve the rights, privileges, and property of the county or of its residents, and to preserve and improve the peace, safety, health, welfare, comfort, and convenience of its residents". He stated that the only winner is the multibillion dollar privately owned corporation. He stated that it was tearing apart the social fabric of the area. He said if the State of Iowa has their way Fremont County will not see the money. He also discussed absentee landowners, the tax abatement the wind company will receive, and other social/economic issues. He said they will speak at the ballot box. Penny Bredensteiner, Locust Grove Township, stated she lives on the Iowa/Missouri border. She said has a tower right outside her house and said dryers are much louder than turbines have ever been. She also discussed plentiful wildlife on and near her property. She discussed people hunting on her ground and with no major industry in Fremont County this will help the tax base. She discussed Sun Valley Lake paying by the inch we have nothing compared to that. She said the state would like to move everything to Council Bluffs. She doesn't want to see services lost locally in our area. She added that she is an advocate of clean energy. She said she does not want to see the progress that had been made stop. Lewis Martin of Sidney discussed coal and nuclear being cleaner forms of energy. Tandon Van Scyoc asked if the board reads ordinances. He quoted an error in the solar ordinance that the board passed that references wind energy devices in the violations and penalties section. He stated that he hasn't received any results of the environmental impact study. He said he has still not seen any of it and the board was supposed to ask for it. He said that page 5 of wind turbine ordinance discusses the location of any conservation areas such as Conservation Reserve Program. Chairman Hickey stated that he has ground in CRP and he believes that the landowner can take it out of CRP at any time by paying back the funds they received. Ida Van Scyoc asked again about the setback map. She asked Invenergy about why her house was not on the map. She stated that ninety-five homes were missing which includes about 74 residents. She questioned how they could miss them if they did their research. She said these weren't dilapidated or abandoned houses. She stated the fact that Invenergy didn't do the research and the board of supervisors didn't do the research. Invenergy rebutted with the fact that they feel confident with the results that they have. There are none that will violate the setback. Van Scyoc questioned why she got a letter, but her house wasn't on the map.

At 9:20 a.m., Sergeant Andrew Wake joined the meeting.

Heather Coulter, Locust Grove, asked if distances will be reviewed, decibels checked, and who pays for additional cost for the oversight. The board stated that the engineer is zoning commissioner. He is absent today because he is in Ames for a schooling. She implored the board to pause their decision. Dennis Almquist of Sidney discussed his concern of energy sprawl. He said the harsh reality is that solar and wind make a larger footprint than coal. He is concerned that the project will expand in the future. Vice Chairman Clark said there are no current plans for any expansion. Clark stated that the application in front of them is for Fremont County. Supervisor Sheldon said if Page County denies their permit they will have to start over again. Sheldon said anything above what is on this application would have to be approved again. Sandra Ohrt-Jensen questioned decommissioning funding/plan. Sheldon stated that no construction can start until the decommissioning and road agreements are in place. She said a big concern is having a tower to for a multi-year agreement and the company goes broke. She asked how they dispose of these turbines and if they end up in the giant landfill. Supervisor Sheldon stated that the board told Invenergy what they must see in the decommissioning agreement. Ohrt-Jensen asked when they are to the point of the decommissioning plan if the citizens have the right to speak. Sheldon said the public always has the right to come into any board meeting. Noel Gandy, 4247 260th Street, said he emailed the board members and got one return email. He said his home was one not on the setback map and it is where turbine number 9 is located. He said many of his neighbor's homes were not on the map either. Charlie Dovel said he is from the

Hamburg area, but he has property in Locust Grove area. He said he is not for the towers. He said they rejected last company that came through and so did his neighbor. His suggestion to the board is to reject this or wait to see what Page County does. Shawn Haynie, 4233 240th Street, Shenandoah, asked about the houses being left off the map. He said there were a lot of questions and discrepancies. He added there was no such thing as free money. Mark Crowl the Iowa Development Manager for Invenergy gave a presentation of slides. He said there are 15 projects in the state and they have learned more with each project. He stated that Invenergy has created local jobs and being a veteran himself he knows high number of veterans they have as employees. He said it is the projected to deliver \$27 million over the life of the project to schools and \$1.5 million to participants. He said that the dollars stay here in the county. He went over the ordinance 2021 and that it outlines wind energy conversion system requirements. He said what the has timeline of the project has been and how they meet or exceed the application or ordinance requirements. They have actually taken a conservative approach. He said the rest of application has additional requirements that they also were meeting and exceeding. Ryan Slater, Fisher Township, asked how many lawsuits Invenergy has against them. Mark Crowl of Invenergy said he was not aware of the number. Slater said the first time he received anything was a letter he received last week. He asked the board if they were going to have them anywhere near their houses. Joan Kirk, Fisher Township, stated that she has not received one map. She said she called the company about being in the flight path of the airport and never heard back. She asked if the Engineer Dan Davis, who she said does a good job, if this would be pushing him thin too thin. She also discussed people that signed for them not living in the county or state and existing solar panels in the county that aren't following requirements in the ordinance. The board stated those were grandfathered in. Mandy Whipple, Locust Grove Township, said she lives right on state line. She said she rarely hears them. She said she was skeptical at first. She said that peace and tranquility are important to her equine business, so she spoke to people in Atchison County who have them and people who do not. She said no one had any complaints. She stated that they have all kinds of wildlife in their area including a bald eagle nest in tree line. She also spoke about the decommissioning and fairly new technology where they take silica out and turn it into concrete. She said Atchison County is seeing the benefits in their schools, non-profits, and mental health system. David Glenn said he lives in Missouri with wind turbines and has land in Locust Grove. He believes a hog barn is worse. He said projects there have expanded and he is seeing more red lights. He said he hears grain silos more than turbines. He said the flicker does seem like a strobe light on a rare occasion when sun is just right in combine. He said he got a turbine in Missouri because his son is into green energy. He said people fought it there and not everyone is going to get what they want. He said it is a good tax base once the abatements go away. Jill Gandy of 4247 260th Street, Shenandoah, stated that they moved here 6 years ago from Mississippi. She said everyone loves their property and they don't want unsightly wind turbines. She said they fell in love with the Midwest. She said when they moved here and didn't have curtains they couldn't stay in the house because the red lights caused her to panic. She said she still doesn't look out those windows. She looks toward Fremont County and Nebraska. She said someone approached them a while back wanting to purchase their property, they never wanted to sell. She said no one wants to buy now. Her house was one of the houses not on the map. Nancy Ohrt, Locust Grove Township, said she was very disappointed in the public hearing. She said she can't hear what anyone was saying and the board was very unprepared. She said it would've helped if they were better prepared for this meeting. Donnie Laumann, Farragut, said he has 900 acres in Missouri with turbines. He said the companies there have done nothing they didn't approve of on their farms. He lives in the Shenandoah School District. He talked about the gymnasium in Tarkio that windmills built, Rock Port built one, and that Westboro has a new fire station. They have four towers and no problems with any of them. He said one farm has two and the only time he hears anything is after shutting off tractor and he hears a woosh, woosh. John Whipple, Locust Grove Township, talked to commissioner of Atchison County about the income for farmers and the property taxes they bring in. He said Tarkio has gotten a lot of economic benefit and economic development. Steve Stenzel, Madison Township, stated he doesn't think the noise from turbines is terrible. He said he can hear them about one and one-half mile away when wind direction is correct. He said there is a woosh and a mechanical whir. He asked if wind towers are going to be allowed near the town of Farragut or Riverton. The board stated that the attorney used an overview of all different counties to develop our ordinance. Stenzel also talked about changes in property values. Jeff Shearer stated he lives on the Goldenrod (310th Street) close to Steve he said he can hear the drone of the generator and sound of blades. He said Warren Buffet said that wind turbines are not viable. He also discussed a generator falling off a trailer on 310th Street once. He said the company sent rep from Spain and that gentleman said even if this would have made to field would wear out before they make any profit. He said tax incentives make it viable and it's called wealth redistribution which is another saying for Socialism. He said the board should have a joint meeting with Page County and see what kind of hornet's nest is stirred up and who they should be protecting. Jane Stimson questioned the number of turbines Atchison how much they have raised. She said there are 300 on 4 farms. She said there are 33 proposed here and that is a huge difference in comparison. Kalen Fulk, Page County resident, asked Invenergy how many sold projects were sold. Invenergy stated they successfully sold all of their wind projects. He discussed the size of the proposed turbines. He ended with a request that they seek legal counsel and put a moratorium on all projects to get holes figured out. Female speaker asked the board to please look further. She asked the board to consider that her house was left off the map, the environmental study not here, decommissioning, not signing after you make a deal, height of the turbines, health studies, no private space, property values going down. Ginger Gruber stated her mother lives in Locust Grove Township. She heard a lot of concerns. She said that naysayers always the loudest. She discussed economic benefits of the project.

At 10:35 a.m., the board took a 10-minute recess. At 10:45 a.m., they board was back in session.

Marvin Gubser, Madison Township, spoke regarding his 8 towers in Missouri and people should be looking at the benefits. He said he lives 200' off of 310th Street and has more trouble with loud pipes on pickups than they ever have with turbines. Sherrie

Brink stood up again. She asked the board is they have ever done any business for wind energy companies in the past and if there was any conflict of interest. The board stated they have not. She said if you vote you cannot use your trucks to haul rock. The board reminded her that she already had her time to speak at the beginning of the meeting. She chose not to use the 5-minutes at that time. The board asked that any callers on the phone state names and told them they had 5-minutes. No response. Christy Slater, Fisher Township, stated they were not aware that there was a proposed turbine right across the fence line from them. She stated the landowner out of state has 120 acres and they were never approached for good neighbor agreement. Attorney Brett Dublinski, Invenergy, spoke and stated he would know if they had been sued regarding earlier questions about lawsuits. He said there is one suit that Invenergy has sued a county regarding site work being done. He stated Fremont County's ordinance is stricter than most. He stated what matters for this decision is the ordinance in place today. Shenandoah Hills Wind application includes all information that the ordinance requires. It has been discussed for months, available months, complied with ordinance, and all they ask is vote yes on the vote scheduled for today. Page County Supervisor Jake Holmes received a letter regarding a suit, vested rights issue before project was even submitted, seeking legal counsel, and using great caution. Norma Troxel, Fisher Township, stated her house was not on map and they received no letter. She questioned if towers are twice as tall is the noise louder. Crowl stated it doesn't mean that larger turbines equal louder turbines. He said the sound profile is not dependent upon the size of the turbines. She asked who will repair the roads and spoke about and eagle nest one mile west of her. She asked the board to please do their due diligence. Dean Weiss, Page County resident that owns property in Fremont County, He discussed the turbines in Orient, IA, and the life expectancy being 10 years. He said two guys that work for REA in Rock Port said they were only working part of the time. He said less than 10% of questions were answered. He asked how much government funding there was. Invenergy assured him there was no government funding only the production tax credit. At this point, IT stated there was a problem unmuting the phone system. Brett Craven, Locust Grove Township, stated he lives ½ mile away from a turbine and gotten used to it. He said sometimes you can feel it at night. Assistant County Ryan Dale said he would prepare a lease and have sign, but FEMA and Iowa Homeland Security have to approve it first. He said that probably wouldn't happen until next summer.

Ida Van Scyoc met with the board regarding a moratorium on further wind turbine projects in the county. She said things were not brought up correctly, some things were not defined such as conservation, and other counties do. She again referenced the solar ordinance with wind energy listed in there. She said she is on admiral trail board and has not gotten far because they need more money. She referenced the setback being from the property line not from foundation. She asks that the board be fair on green energy projects. The board stated they are not opposed to this. They will take a look at her suggestions. Motion by Hickey to table the issue of a moratorium on future wind projects. Motion carried unanimously.

Motion by Clark to sign FY22 audit services letter with Gronewold, Bell, Kyhnn, & Co., P.C. Motion carried unanimously.
